

AOH UNVEILS DIVISION BANNERS

To present an even better image to the community, the State Board of the AOH commissioned a banner representing each division in the state of Louisiana. The banners, officially called "gonfalons," represent the city and/or region encompassed by each division.

The Archbishop Hannan Division, the first division of the newly reconstituted AOH in 1988 covers the city of New Orleans and the Parish of Orleans. Thus, its banner contains the flag of the City of New Orleans. The Cardinal Gibbons Division banner holds the flag of Jefferson Parish as it covers the entire Parish of Jefferson and the Metro area outside of New Orleans.



Outside of the New Orleans Metro Area, our division in Tangipahoa recognizes the brief

but significant Republic of West Florida with the "Bonnie Blue Flag" that flew over the Florida Parishes briefly in 1810 prior to American annexation.

Last but not least, the Acadian Division banner hearkens back to the unique relationship of the Acadians and the Irish as people often oppressed and forced into exile. Thus, its banner contains the Acadian flag.

The banners will be used at all AOH Division meetings, carried into church for each Mass, and carried during parades.

HISTORICAL MOMENT—"GARRYOWEN"

Each St. Patrick's Day, the men of the AOH make an emotional and stirring march into the grand ballroom to the music of the United States Marine Corps. The hymn to which we march is called "Garryowen," and we have heard that tune many times.

The origins of Garryowen are unclear, but it emerged in late eighteenth century Limerick. It obtained immediate popularity in the British Army and became the regimental march of the Royal Irish Regiment, the Irish Regiment of Canada, the Liverpool Irish, and the London Irish Rifles.

Garryowen was also a favorite in the Crimean War, but it achieved fame in America when the famous 69th New York Infantry Regiment "the Fighting 69th" adopted

"Garryowen" before the Civil War.

It later became the marching tune for the U.S. 7th Cavalry Regiment during the late 1800s. The tune was a favorite of General George Armstrong Custer and became the official tune of the regiment in 1867. According to legend it was the last tune played before the Battle of the Little Bighorn.

The "Fighting 69th" adopted Garry Owen before the Civil War and recently brought it back to combat in Operation Iraqi Freedom while the 7th U.S. Cavalry (now a part of the U.S. 1st Cavalry Division) played the tune when they were the first to enter Baghdad.

The word *garryowen* is derived from the Irish, the proper name *Eóghan* ("born of the yew tree") and the word for garden *garrai* -

thus "Eóghan's Garden". The term refers to an area of the town of Limerick, Ireland.

The song has made many an appearance in film, most notably John Wayne westerns, *They Died with Their Boots On* with Errol Flynn, *The Last Samurai* with Tom Cruise, *The Long Gray Line* with Tyrone Power, *Night at the Museum*, and *The Fighting 69th* with James Cagney and Pat O'Brien.

So when we march into the ballroom in 2010, let us remember the words of our tune and help out with the chorus:

*Instead of spa, we'll drink brown ale
And pay the reckoning on the nail;
No man for debt shall go to jail
From Garryowen in glory.*
